




WHY do I have to transition from CHEO when I turn 18?

Because your IBD is a life-long condition...and CHEO only provides care for patients under 18 years of age!

You'll need to connect with different doctors who can help you as an adult.






So far, your family and your health care team at CHEO have been by your side.

When it comes to managing a complicated disease like IBD, **it's difficult to know what the right decisions are sometimes...**

This is why it is important to start your transition process...TODAY!

What is 'transition' anyway?

TRANSITION is a stepping-stone process of preparing IBD patients at CHEO for the transfer to adult care.



When should I start the transition process?

This process will help you:

- Get ready to take charge of your IBD care
- Follow the road to being independent

It's never too early to start!

What do I need to know to have a successful transition?

- Your disease and its basic nature
- The name, dose and side effects of your medications
- Your medical history
- The impact of your lifestyle choices on your health
- The impact of your disease on school, relationships, and your daily life





Adult IBD doctors have told us that **ONLY 1 out of 3 transferred patients** know their medications.







With a well-planned transition where YOU take charge, you may have fewer:

- Flares
- Medication changes
- Tests
- Hospital admissions!



Your IBD team wants to help you!

- Get a clearer understanding of IBD
- Start taking charge of your care
- Improve your health by reducing chances of:
 - A problem caused by your IBD
 - Your IBD becoming active again
 - A problem with your treatment

 - Social Workers



You will soon be turning 18 and transitioning out of CHEO care. Building Knowledge and Practicing Independence

You'll start to see an adult IBD doctor so it's now time for you to take charge and be fully independent!



How is adult care different than the care at CHEO?

- At CHEO, care centers around your family. In adult care, it is focused on YOU!
- Appointments may be shorter and more direct
- Tests may be different

There may be more CT scans, fewer blood tests, fewer tests for growth-related issues (like bone development)



How else will my care be different?

Because endoscopy is an important part of understanding your IBD, your adult IBD doctor may want to do a scope soon after taking over your care.

- Scopes are rarely done under general anesthesia because otherwise there can be a very long wait
- Though you won't be completely asleep, you will get medications that will take away pain, and you will often forget what happened












- I can tell others what subtype of IBD I have, how severe it was when I was diagnosed, and how it affects me now.

- I know the names of my medications, the doses, and when to take them.






































What else should I know?

These things would help me to be independent!

- I know possible medication side effects
- I know when and how to get more refills
- I can ask my pharmacist about interactions between medications
- I can prepare my medications in advance of overnight trips or vacations



Knowing how to deal with problems is an important part of taking charge of your IBD. I can tell when I'm having a flare I know how to make a clinic appointment I know the names of the basic tests and the purpose of them. I know how to take my temperature I know how to keep a stool and symptom calendar
