Using a spacer with mouthpiece

MDI



What is a spacer?

A spacer is used along with your child's MDI (metered dose inhaler) to help your child absorb the medication into the lungs. The instructions in this fact sheet are for the AeroChamber MaxTM VHC, which is the spacer we use at CHEO. Other spacers are available and the instructions for use are similar.

Why does my child need a spacer?

A spacer gets the medication into the lungs better. A spacer is always needed if your child takes steroid medications.

When can my child begin using a spacer with mouthpiece?

- Children can begin using one when they are able to keep their lips tightly around the mouthpiece
- Most children can use a spacer with mouthpiece around 5 years of age.

How do we use the spacer?

- 1. Prepare the MDI:
 - Remove the cap
 - Shake the cannister well
 - Place it upright in the rubber opening at the back of the spacer
- 2. Place the mouthpiece of the spacer into your child's mouth and have her close her lips tightly around the mouthpiece.
- 3. Press down on the cannister, to release one puff of medication into the spacer.
- 4. Ask your child to take one slow breath in through the mouth as deeply as possible, holding it for 10-15 seconds. The blue inspiratory valve on the mouthpiece adapter should move towards your child. If you are using an AeroChamber Max[™] VHC, you will hear a musical sound if your child breathes too quickly. If this happens, have your child breathe more slowly.

If your child cannot hold one breath for 10-15 seconds, have him take 3-4 slow breaths instead.

- 5. If your doctor told you to give more than one puff of medication, wait 30 seconds, then repeat steps 1-4.
- 6. Take the MDI out of the spacer. Put the mouthpiece cover back on the MDI to keep dust and lint out.



If you're giving inhaled steroid medication:

Reduce the risk of thrush (yeast infection) in the mouth by:

• Having your child rinse her mouth with water after the medication.
